HERE, THERE, SOMEWHERE

Time and space make us naturally talk in terms of now, then and when; and in terms of here, there, where, somewhere, everywhere, and nowhere. While still "in" our bodies, these terms work pretty well; but, what of the day when we will be "outside" our bodies? It's clear that a person can exist "whether in the body...or whether out of the body" (2 Corinthians 12:2). A man "at home in the body" is "absent from the Lord" (5:6). Another way to describe being "in the body" is being "in this tabernacle" (v. 4). Death happens when "the earthly house of our tabernacle [is] dissolved" (v. 1). Peter knew that great changes were about to happen to him. He said, "Shortly I must put off this my tabernacle, even as our Lord Jesus Christ hath shewed me" (2 Peter 1:14). In the meantime, he resolved, "As long as I am in this tabernacle, [I will] stir you up by putting you in remembrance" (v. 14). The day came; Peter left his tabernacle. Where did he go? Where is he? A man dies; or, his body is dissolved; or, he is out of his body. But, he, the man his spirit being out of his body, is yet, somewhere. Where? The short answer is: At death, the spirit of every person leaves the body and goes to Hades. But, all Hadean occupancy is not equal. Christ, after his death, was in "hades" (Acts 2:31); yet, before he died, he told the penitent thief, "Today shalt thou be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43). Was Jesus both in Hades and in Paradise? That's not so complicated. We're in Tennessee, but we're also in Manchester. What about the other thief? He died. He left his body. Where did his spirit go? The short answer? He went to Hades; but he surely didn't go to Paradise. He is in "prison" (1 Peter 3:19). He was "cast into hell" (2 Peter 2:4); that is — Peter here uses a verb form of the word "tartarus" — he was "imprisoned." We could also say, that the other thief, like the rich man in Luke 16, went to "torment." So, like Jesus and the penitent thief, the impenitent thief went to Hades, but in Hades, he's not in paradise, rather

prison? Yes. And, again that's not complicated. I visited a woman who is in Tennessee, just like I

am; but she's in jail, and I'm not.

All the dead, from Adam to this very present, are in Hades. Those who died as faithful children of God are in Paradise. Those who otherwise died are in torment or Prison. At the resurrection, Hades will be emptied, and all disembodied souls will be raised and given what Paul, in 1 Corinthians 15:44, calls "a spiritual body." The righteous spirits will leave Paradise; the wicked spirits will leave Prison (tartarus). Then, after the judgment, the righteous will dwell in Heaven and the wicked will exist in Hell forever.

Because the Bible's primary emphasis is on judgment and eternity, it gives us scant information about Hades. Just think, Lazarus the brother of Mary and Martha died but was brought back from Hades; likewise with Tabitha the beloved sister in Christ at Joppa. What a trip: Departing earth via death, entering Hades, and then having one's disembodied spirit reinhabit his abandoned tabernacle. Think of all the experiences we're prone to excitedly relate. Surely the silence of the Bible on the experiences of such people as Lazarus and Tabitha, who had been to the spirit-land and back is significant. Reports of people who "died" and "came back," telling about bright lights at the end of a tunnel are suspect and of no value to us.

It is important to know that it "is appointed unto men once to die." Death is both permanent as to the end of our sojourn on earth, and as to the end of any opportunity to edit the record of one's life. Death is not an additional opportunity to reflect, repent, and be saved. Death has the effect of settling our "place" in eternity. Judas died and went "to his own place" (Acts 1:25). So, shall it be with us all. In death our spirits will enter Hades where a "fixed" "gulf" will separate those in paradise from those in torment. So, asking, "Are you ready to go" is not a trite question.

MEMORY VERSE FOR THE WEEK

GREEK WORD OF THE WEEK

Word: orgizō (οργίζω)

Pronounced: or-gid'-zo

Translated into the word we use today: Angry or Wroth

Meaning: according to Strong is: to provoke or enrage, that is, (passively) become exasperated: - be angry (wroth). Thayer says this 1) to provoke, to arouse to anger, 2) to be provoked to anger, be angry, be wroth

Supporting verse: Mat 18:34-35 And his master was angry, and delivered him to the torturers until he should pay all that was due to him. (35) "So My heavenly Father also will do to you if each of you, from his heart, does not forgive his brother his trespasses."

THOUGHT OF THE WEEK

Most of the time when we think of God, we think of the great God of love, which He is. We think of all the great things He has done for us such as giving us life (Genesis 2:7), giving us great things (James 1:17), and sending His son to die for us so that we can have forgiveness of our sins (John 3:16). There are so many other things that God has done for us and continues to do on a daily bases that show His goodness, and we need not forget this. But this does not give us the right to overlook the wrath of God. Notice back in Zechariah 1:2, that "the Lord has been VERY ANGRY with our fathers". Notice again that God was very angry. We must also understand the anger and wrath of God and the punishments it leads to along with the love of God and the reward that it leads us to. In Hebrews 10, after it talks about forsaking the assembly and sinning willfully, it says in verse 31, "It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God." Why is it fearful? Why should we be afraid? Because God is a God of anger, wrath and punishment. We don't want to be on the "bad side" of God. We should never anger God and have Him upset with us and our actions. We can avoid falling into the wrath and anger of God by living a life that is pleasing to Him. Do the things that He tells us to do, and we will be pleasing to Him.
